From the Lay Leader

As I write a storm is blowing around our city. It's one of those November storms, not especially cold but wet and very windy. The air is full of leaves and noise and movement and I rather like the energy of it.

It feels like the whole world is tempestuous at the moment and that is a hard storm to enjoy. There is tension within and between nations. Xenophobia and prejudice seem to be on the increase more or less everywhere. There are some leaders whose approach is based on thoughtful listening and a positive, generous view of human beings, but these are not generally the leaders winning elections.

Each year as Christmas approaches I find myself thinking of Mary and the turbulent circumstances in which she gave birth to her son. Herod was an insecure and brutal king, Israel was occupied and a Roman census had forced Mary to travel to her husband's hometown of Bethlehem. She had her baby and a group of shepherds, who had been told by an angel that her son was the Messiah, were wild with excitement. They rushed around the town telling everyone what had happened. In the Gospel of Luke Mary, seems to enjoy this moment, but quietly; *But Mary treasured these things and pondered them in her heart.* (Luke 2:19)

I know Mary is problematic to the modern reader: her story that of a real woman who is really pregnant, is not recorded in the Bible. Yet there is something touching about her inwardness, about the way she keeps her own counsel as the world rages on around her. She is the still centre of the Christmas story.

In times such as ours places and practices of stillness are precious. I am grateful to our congregation and our staff at Brighton Unitarian Church for working so hard over the last few years. I'm moved by our collective insistence that our church - a place of quiet contemplation, open minds and mutual respect - matters enough to be worth maintaining. We have secured a place for the city centre that is not primarily about entertainment, profit or pleasure but whose focus is the inner life. There is something hugely encouraging and positive about what we have achieved.

I wish you a Happy Christmas and a Peaceful New Year.

I have been attending the Unitarian church in Brighton for more than 5 years. I'm not sure what drew me in but I was surprised at what I found. I would suggest that despite the traditional layout and structures of Unitarianism, the ethos and attitude can be quite radical.

I think what made me stay was how accepting the congregation was. No question about what I believed in or whether I agreed but just a kind encouragement. There was no sense of me having to fit in or compromise my self or my own belief system. I enjoy being gently challenged, educated and inspired.

I realised this summer that not only am I a religious being - as opposed to simply spiritual - but that my religious world has to find its roots in the world, and has to include different faiths and perspective. No one place has all the answers to my questions and I suppose that could make me polytheistic. I would call myself religious because I can't carry out a practice of connecting with the invisible, ancient, sacred otherness of life without help and guidance, and without ritual and community. And this practice is crucial to my well being, providing a sense of belonging in a world where I can so easily get lost.

I decided to become a member because I realised that the Unitarian church is worthy of some commitment. To step a little closer to that which provides me with inner nourishment. I have come to value the church and the community and it has found a place within the religious infrastructure of my life. By becoming a member I hope to invest more of myself into the church and engage more fully to the practice of Unitarianism.
