From the Lay Leader

When I was in my teens I loved Jesus for that cry of anger and despair howled at God from the cross: *Eli, Eli, lama sabachthani; my God, my God, why hast Thou forsaken me?* These are the only words of Jesus in the whole New Testament which are quoted in Hebrew. This is a clue that what sounds spontaneous has a history. Jesus is quoting from Psalm 22 in the Old Testament which says *My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me? Why thou so far from saving me, so far from the words of my roaring?*

Later in that Psalm 22 we hear the assembly of the wicked have inclosed me, *they pierced my hands and my feet. I may tell all my bones; they look and stare upon me. They part my garments among them and cast lots upon my vesture.* The psalm was written by King David, and in the Easter narrative Jesus uses it to rebuke the scribes and elders who have connived to have him killed. They have just sneered at him saying *If he be the king of Israel; let him come down now from the cross, and we will believe in him.* (Matthew, 27:42)

When Jesus says *Eli, Eli, lamma sabachthani* he is invoking a revered King of the Jews, who wrote precisely of his own abjection and bitterness. It is a kind of scholarly throwdown to the scribes and elders.

In his teachings Jesus does this repeatedly. He challenges the religious authorities who condemn him by quoting their scriptures back at them. For example he accuses the Pharisees of *teaching as doctrine the commandments of men.*

In other words: don't confuse your particular laws with the universal, with the divine. Again the the phrase *teaching as doctrine the commandments of men* comes from the Book of Isaiah. In all the fog of debate about Jesus and the meaning of his story we might miss this about him: as a scholar and wordsmith he is brilliant.

And for me this brilliance is one of the meanings of Easter. At the heart of the story is a deeply thoughtful challenge to established religious practices that ultimately results in the rebirth of faith itself, not its demise or rejection. Religion is too beautiful, too powerful, too real to be left in the wrong hands. In the spirit of Easter let's return it to its origins in kindness, awe, gratitude and wholeness. I wish you a Happy Easter.

We have been looking at ways in which we can offer support to Brighton's homeless and rough sleepers. There is a lack of resources at the weekend across the city and having visited Holland Rd Baptist Church in Hove, who provide a monthly cafe on a Saturday lunchtime we are keen to offer something similar at the BUC.

The cafe would run on a Saturday lunchtime for a couple of hours providing a simple hot lunch of cheese toasties, tea, cake in a clean safe and friendly environment offering a chance for a chat and support.

How can you help Tea and Toasties?

Be part of the working party to get this idea up and running - we already have the support of

Holland Rd Baptist Church and Greg Headley who is the local co-ordinator for homeless provision across the city

Become a volunteer for the cafe by:

Offering time on a Friday eve or sat morning to help prepare sandwiches and set up the cafe

Being a volunteer at the cafe to help take orders or serve tea coffee and toasties

Help clear up at the end of the session

Offer to make some cake or biscuits

Do the shopping at the cash and carry

In the first instance we are hoping to run this as a pilot for 3 months . This is a wonderful opportunity to support vulnerable people in our community for a few hours each month.
